50 years' ago, the 'Battlers' took a stand to fight for their children's right to play in a bushland environment. In this anniversary year, the Friends of Kelly's Bush wanted to pay homage to the courage and determination of those fearless women and the principled and community-minded men who supported them. We were very honoured that Dr Joan Croll, the last of the band of 'Battlers' and Judy Mundey, Jack's widow, were both able to join us.

The event started with a warm welcome to everyone for coming to celebrate this significant anniversary and then proceeded with a formal acknowledgment of the Traditional Owners of the land on which we met.

Before handing over to Mayor Ross Williams to start the proceedings, the secretary thanked him for his constant and enthusiastic support of the Kelly's Bush bushcarers and told the audience that the Mayor had been working tirelessly behind the scenes to find the funds to upgrade the walking track – which has now been achieved and work will start next year!
